# Members Elect Officers and Board for 2014-2015

In the business session of the Annual Meeting, members elected the USLT leadership team for the coming year:

Rossie Corwon, President Hamp Warner, Vice President Rick Green, Secretary L. B. Adams, Treasurer

Their terms of office become effective July 1, 2014.

Current President Andy Robinson will become Past President. Wallace Wood will remain as Executive Director of the USLT.

Dr. Patrick McMillan, Director of the South Carolina Botanical Garden, treated the USLT Annual Meeting to a visual presentation of "Preserving the Essence of South Carolina."

Patrick contrasted the bio-diversity of upstate South Carolina with that of many other special places, showing that we live in a virtual Eden of species, both plant and animal. The question is, Patrick asked, "How do we preserve the special nature of South Carolina with the vast majority of land in private ownership?" According to Patrick, the answer lies in the special relationship between the land and conservation-minded owners. This relationship is exemplified by the many owners who set aside natural areas through easements.

Change is one of the constants that exerts both constraints and opportunities for species. Patrick noted both the current warming of the climate and the long-term changes in climate since the last ice age have pressured the movement, proliferation and extinction of species.

Even in recent centuries, the Piedmont did not always look the way it is today. Patrick pointed out the work of early naturalist Mark Catesby as a baseline by which to judge modern change. Writings by Catesby and others show that Bison and Forest Elk, along with fire spread by Native Americans, kept the Piedmont in an open prairie-like landscape. This refutes the notion that the upstate was all forested when the first Europeans arrived, according to Patrick.

Patrick received a standing ovation from the appreciative crowd.



#### From the President's Desk . . .

It has been a busy year, and, as an organization, we have taken actions to become increasingly stronger for years to come. When I review 2013, I am pleased to note that we accepted 7 new easements totaling 1,980 acres, and 2014 is beginning just as strong.

Our committees are functioning well, allowing the board to meet our yearly and long term goals. In 2013, our Monitoring Committee accomplished the monitoring of all easements in record time. A new Records Review Committee was formed in 2013 to perform internal self-audits of our documentation folders for easements. The Annual Meeting Committee pulled off an exceptional event exceeding all expectations, showcasing our organization and thrilling the attendees with Patrick McMillan's presentation. The completion of an

external third party financial audit paved the way to turn over our accounting responsibilities to the Upper Savannah Council of Governments.

As we look to the future, the board agreed to take two major steps to strengthen the future of our organization. First, the board approved the purchase of insurance to cover each easement in the event legal action is needed to enforce the will of the donor. Second, the board agreed to begin the process of pursuing national accreditation through the Land Trust Alliance, a 2-5 year commitment to make the USLT a "best-inclass" organization.

I want to say a sincere THANK YOU to the board for its unwavering support and to the easement donors who make it all possible.

### Annual Report: Moderate Growth in 2013

The USLT received easements on 1,980 acres in 2013, making it another good year in conserving land. The USLT now holds conservation easements on **34,127** acres in the western Piedmont. The trust continues to hold an easement in Aiken County in order to accommodate a donor who had other easements held by the USLT within its service area. All other easements are in the service area. The total number of easements held by the USLT increased by 7 to 72 in 2013. A breakdown of the easements is shown below:
